









TURKISH FILM INDUSTRY 2019 REPORT

Having started to come alive in the middle of 1990s, the 2000s have been the most productive and most successful years for Turkish film industry, both nationally and internationally. Whilst a total of 394 films were released in 2017, of which 151 were Turkish, in 2018 a total of 442 films were released and 180 of them were local productions. In 2019, 408 films were released and 146 of them were Turkish.

In 2018, the number of admissions for 180 Turkish films has been 44.635.574. In 2019, 33.790.600 tickets were sold for 146 Turkish films. When it is compared with 2018, there was a decrease in total number of theatrically released films and a 15% decrease in total admissions. Market share for local films decreased from 63% to 56%, when it is compared with 2018. It is also observed that Turkey is still behind European countries in terms of admissions with proportion to the population. Though, the country still has a small film market compared to its population of 80 million, and as such it has a high potential for growth and it is very important to mention that Turkish films still have the strength to dominate local box office.

Distribution

Free market conditions apply for the Turkish film distribution industry, with no subsidies or incentives. In 2019, 20 distribution companies have been active in Turkey, among which CGV Mars, UIP, TME Films, CJ Entertainment and Warner Bros dominated the market.

Among the 408 new releases in 2019, 7. Koğustaki Mucize, which is based on 2013 South Korean movie Miracle in Cell No. 7, became the most watched film with 5.310.542 admissions. In 2019, 6 of the top 10 films at the box office were Turkish productions. In spite of the fact that six of the top ten films were Turkish ones, the total number of admissions of these six films represent 54% of total admissions of the 146 new Turkish releases. Looking at this picture, it goes without saying that the increase in the numbers of productions and admissions do not support each other in the Turkish cinema. Although the Turkish cinema manages to make popular films that draw millions of people to movie theaters during the recent years, the films that are not competitive in the commercial sense can only reach a limited admission figure.

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In November 2013 Turkey met with a new distribution model which was arranged for the sake of independent films that have struggled to find a theater to be released. BAŞKA SİNEMA (Alternative Cinema) became the new distribution model for well-liked national and international films. Since its foundation, BAŞKA SİNEMA screened more than 300 independent films in selected theaters.

Support

A considerable increase has been recorded in terms of production of Turkish films thanks the support provided by the Ministry of Culture and Tourism since 2005 and the increasing admission numbers of Turkish films. While only 9 Turkish films were released in 2002, this figure has increased to 146 in 2019. The support from the Ministry of Culture and Tourism was the only national support mechanism for local productions till 2015. Yeni Film Fonu (New Film Fund) which was founded four years ago by non-for-profit cultural institution Anadolu Kültür and !f Istanbul Independent Film Festival, started to support films.

While the guilds and the trade unions for the audiovisual industry in Turkey are not yet as powerful as their counterparts in Europe or the U.S., there are ten active institutions in the industry. With the new regulations in intellectual property law, activity and effectiveness of these institutions will increase.

In 2019, 19 out of 146 newly released Turkish films have received support from the Turkish Ministry of Culture and Tourism's production funding. This table gathers the data on these supported films.

European Co-Productions

Among the films released in 2019, 5 of them were European co-productions: *Saf* (dir. Ali Vatansever), *A Tale of Three Sisters* (*Kız Kardeşler*; dir. Emin Alper), *Sibel* (dir. Çağla Zencirci, Guillaume Giovanetti), *Brothers* (*Kardeşler*; dir. Ömür Atay) and *Passed by Censor* (*Görülmüştür*; dir. Serhat Karaaslan).

There is a significant increase in the number of Turkish productions, but the same increase can't be observed in the number of Number of Films Received Support from Turkish Ministry of Culture and Tourism General Directorate of Cinema

co-productions. In January 2019, a new law was passed regarding the support from the Ministry of Culture and Tourism. Besides local productions, the Ministry will support Turkish co-producers contributing to the production of foreign films. The law also introduces % 30 tax incentive to foreign productions that are fully or partially shot in Turkey.

Television

Since the deregulation of the monopoly of the public broadcasting and establishment of private TV channels in 1990, TV productions and commercials have been important venues for developing the technological and human capital for the Turkish Cinema. Although TV networks do not commission TV films, there is a huge market for TV series. Recently, Turkish TV series have started to access the Middle Eastern, North African and Balkan markets, where they are followed with much interest. With the new law passed in January 2019, the Ministry of Tourism and Culture starts to support TV productions as well.

Besides conventional TV channels, Turkey's first digital streaming service BluTV has been producing high quality TV series since 2017. The service hires award-winning local directors like Emin Alper, Tolga Karaçelik and Seren Yüce. Meanwhile, Netflix has also started producing local original content. The Protector (Hakan: Muhafiz) was the service's first Turkish content and it was a big hit not only in Turkey but in many different countries as well. Netflix also begins producing original local films this year. It seems the streaming services' focus on local production will support the industry on different levels in the near future.
