



TURKISH FILM INDUSTRY 2020 REPORT

Having started to come alive in the middle of 1990s, the 2000s have been the most productive and most successful years for Turkish film industry, both nationally and internationally. Whilst a total of 442 films were released in 2018, of which 180 were Turkish, in 2019 a total of 408 films were released and 146 of them were local productions.

In 2020, because of the restrictions due to the pandemic, the number of films released in Turkish theaters was limited to 181. Among those, 58 were local productions. In the second week of March nearly all public spaces in Turkey, including movie theaters were shut down. After a four-month break, movie theaters opened again in July but this lasted only until mid-November. Theaters were able to host screenings for a total of seven months during the entire year. As in many other countries, some local films that could not be released theatrically made their premieres on streaming platforms like Netflix, MUBI or BluTV.

In 2019, the number of admissions for 146 Turkish films has been 33.790.600. In 2020, 13.957.633 tickets were sold for 58 local films. When it is compared with 2019, there was a dramatic decrease in total number of theatrically released

films and a 70% decrease in total admissions. However market share for local films increased from 56% to 80,2%, when it is compared with 2019. It is very important to mention that Turkish films, even in the most extraordinary conditions, have the strength to dominate local box office.

Distribution

Free market conditions apply for the Turkish film distribution industry, with no subsidies or incentives. In 2020, 18 distribution companies have been active in Turkey, among which CJET, UIP and CGV Mars dominated the market.

Among the 181 new releases in 2020, a local comedy film *Eltilerin Savaşı* became the most watched film with 3.630.822 admissions. In 2020, all of the top 10 films at the box office were Turkish productions. The total number of admissions of these films represent 70% of total admissions of the 181 releases. Although the Turkish cinema manages to make popular films that draw millions of people to movie theaters during the recent years, the films that are not competitive in the commercial sense can only reach a limited admission figure.

In November 2013 Turkey met with a new distribution model which was arranged for the sake of independent films that have struggled to find a theater to be released. BAŞKA SİNEMA (Alternative Cinema) became the new distribution model for well-liked national and international films. Since its foundation, BAŞKA SİNEMA screened more than 300 independent films in select theaters. They were able to release 22 films in 2020.

Support

A considerable increase has been recorded in terms of production of Turkish films thanks to support provided by the Ministry of Culture and Tourism since 2005 and the increasing admission numbers of Turkish films. While only 9 Turkish films were released in 2002, this figure has increased to 146 in 2019. While the guilds and the trade unions for the audiovisual industry in Turkey are not yet as powerful as their counterparts in Europe or the U.S., there are ten active institutions in the industry. With the new regulations in intellectual property law, activity and effectiveness of these institutions will increase.

In 2020, 7 out of 58 newly released Turkish films have received support from the Turkish Ministry of Culture and Tourism's production funding. This table gathers the data on these supported films.

European Co-Productions

Among the films released in 2020, 4 of them were European co-productions: You Know Him (Nasipse Adayız; dir. Ercan Kesal), Noah Land (Nuh Tepesi; dir. Cenk Ertürk), Scent of My Daughter (Kızım Gibi Kokuyorsun; dir. Olgun Özdemir) and The Hardest Thing (Acı Kiraz; dir. Serdar Akar).

There is a significant increase in the number of Turkish productions, but the same increase can't be observed in the number of co-productions. In January 2019, a new law was passed regarding the support from the Ministry of Culture and Tourism. Besides local productions, the Ministry started to support Turkish co-producers contributing to the production of foreign films. The law also introduces % 30 tax incentive to foreign productions that are fully or partially shot in Turkey.

Television

Since the deregulation of the monopoly of the public broadcasting and establishment of private TV channels in 1990, TV productions and commercials have been important venues for developing the technological and human capital for the Turkish Cinema. Although TV networks do not commission TV films, there is a huge market for TV series. Recently, Turkish TV series have started to access the Middle Eastern, North African and Balkan markets, where they are followed with much interest. With the new law passed in January 2019, the Ministry of Tourism and Culture starts to support TV productions as well.
